

"These horror facts are shocking, but not surprising. Brazil's military masters, led by a slow-minded general named Medici, want their own way, and anyone who criticizes or questions that way is an automatic enemy of the state. It's an old story, but the tragic irony is that only a few years ago, Brazil was being hailed by Washington as an example for all Latin America. If a free election were held/in Brazil--an impossibility--the man who was most vocally anti-government would win hands down.

"Since the generals know only the language of brutality and force, many of those seeking to fight Brazil's immense poverty and injustice are learning the language of violence also. This explains the growing anti-government terrorism in the country's larger cities.

"Incredibly, Nelson Rockefeller on his visit to Brazil last June 'to find facts' was favorably impressed by the generals. Contrary to the wisdom of some of his advisers, Rockefeller urged continued close relations between Brazil and the United States. But in the atmosphere of the increasing political oppression practiced by the generals and the hopes for social justice expressed by many Brazilian students, intellectuals and priests, a nasty showdown is coming which will oblige this country to make a choice. And the United States, & as so often before in its foreign relations, is in danger of
